

Layout of the Month: CASG's Modular Layout

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October's regular meeting is October 19th. The contest is "Illuminated Rolling Stock or Structure" and the clinic by Don Cook, MMR, is "The Milwaukee Road Remembered". See you there! For 45 years the Chicagoland Association of S Gaugers, Inc. has existed to promote and enjoy model railroading in S scale, considered by many in our hobby to be the "ideal size scale" in model railroading. For 20 years the Association has had a modular layout to enjoy and display at shows. This layout is October's "Layout of the Month". With code 148 rail, the CASG's layout can accommodate both hi-rail and scale S gauge locomotives and rolling stock. Hi-rail rolling stock are generally the models of choice for CASG's modular layout at shows, but don't equate today's hi-rail with the old AF hi-rail equipment. Gone are the old AF track, stamped truck frames,



and monster couplers. "Modern" hi-rail has scale looking track, beautifully detailed rolling stock, and scale size couplers. Says FVD and CASG member Joel Lebovitz, "The new S gauge offerings are much more to scale than the old AF models of the 40's and 50's. The only ways you can tell con't on p.3

Fun Stuff by Jim Allen

This loco is crazier than it first appears. It is not an 0-2-4 as I mistakenly said last month (by not carefully reading the caption Jim provided). It's actually an 0-1-2! It is not sitting on two rails, but only one rail. Note the overhead rail which looks kind of like a monorail and acts as a stabilizer for the loco. I think the one thing I did get right on this contraption was that it was most likely built sometime in the mid 18th century. Sorry for last month's mess up, Jim! WH



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(con't from p.1) scale from hi-rail is by the deep flanges and larger couplers on the hi-rail." Like the other scales, S gaugers are now seeing perhaps the largest amount of equipment ever being offered in their scale. Lionel is coming out with more S scale, and MTH has jumped into the mix, having purchased the excellent S Helper line of trains in 2013. The CASG has sister groups in St.Louis, Milwaukee, and Beliot/Rockford, and belongs to the national NASG organization. Modeling Tip: How About S Scale?

As modelers get older, some are considering larger scales to model in. The larger size makes for models that are easier to build and handle, track that is easier to maintain, and layouts that are less complicated (because it's harder to cram as much track into them!). While O, On3, and G are popular choices for those moving to larger scales, S scale might be a nice alternative for those who don't want to go "really big". S scale combines the size, weight and tracking of the larger scales with the look and feel of HO and N scales. A lot of beautiful S scale locomotives and rolling stock are currently available from Lionel, American Models, MTH (former S Helper line) and a host of smaller manufacturers. Excellent track systems, structure, figures, vehicles, detail parts, etc. are also available. The more you look into it, the more attractive the scale becomes, but this admittedly comes from a guy who had and loved American Flyer as a kid! WH

My Summer Vacation, part 2:

After the stop in Green Bay at the RR Museum, Jim Allen and I continued our trip up nort' and over-nighted in Iron Mountain. Starting out early the next day, we headed out east to Vulcan, Michigan to the Iron Mt. Iron Mine. We entered into the gift shop (tourist trap, remember?), and bought tickets for the mine tour. After going through the displays of various minerals, we were in the back of the shop when an older gentleman entered and asked that the next mine tour group don rain slickers and hard hats. The rain slicker had a flannel liner, and I fortunately had my IRM sweatshirt on because the mine was a balmy 43 degrees inside. Out the back we went where we were treated to a display of mining tools and a demonstration of a compressed air-powered mine skip loader. What a huge racket it made ... and we were still outside. Imagine what it sounded like inside a mine shaft! We boarded a train of mine gauge tram cars, custom made with bench seating. The guide turned on the lights in the shaft and they looked like they went on forever. We entered into the 400 level (meaning 400 feet of rock above your head), and were being hauled down by an electric locomotive. Oh, boy, did the walls close in. Imagine taking all the shelves out of your refrigerator, putting a chair inside, sitting on the chair and closing the door. We went down about 1250 feet, then debarked and walked about 2 blocks inside the mine looking at the displays of tools and equipment and the ore lode. On the map of the mine shafting, we were only near the top of the underground shafts! My glasses fogged up when we returned up top to the sunshine, but we were relieved to be back above ground. I really had gained an appreciation of those hard working miners of times past. Seeing and reliving what those early miners did is sure to give authenticity to mining areas for those modeling the mining industry. But "seeing and reliving" can apply to any industry on your railroad. So go find some appropriate "tourist trap" museums to check out!


September's Clinic

About the Fox Valley Division


